Talking Points for a Discussion on CRT

projecting their own agendas onto children and shaping their perceptions of race relations in our country.

- 6. Promoting Understanding and Unity: Instead of fostering division or animosity, discussions around race and diversity should aim to promote understanding, empathy, and unity. It's not only possible, but imperative, that we approach these topics in a way that respects individual experiences and perspectives.
- 7. Influence of Teacher Training in CRT: Training teachers in Critical Race Theory, even if the curriculum itself is not directly incorporated into students' learning materials, can significantly influence how educators approach and teach certain topics. For instance, teachers who have undergone CRT training may be more inclined to view educational content through a critical lens that emphasizes systemic racism and social justice issues.
 - This influence can manifest in various ways, including how teachers frame discussions on historical events, address diversity and inclusion in the classroom, and navigate sensitive topics related to race and ethnicity.
 - While teacher training in CRT can enhance educators' awareness of social inequalities and biases, it may also shape their teaching methodologies and perspectives on how to address these issues with students.
